

Who Wants to Get Fracked?!?

Hydraulic fracturing, better known as **fracking**, is the current extreme form of oil and gas extraction. Voluntary reporting has documented 628 wells fracked last year (2011) in California. They are drilling in Sutter, Yuba, Sacramento, San Joaquin, Monterey, Santa Barbara, Kern, Ventura and Los Angels counties, with mineral rights being purchased in Glenn and Colusa counties by drilling companies.

The process of fracking involves injecting millions of gallons of fresh water typically mixed with toxic industrial chemicals and sand. This mixture is placed at a high enough well pressure to fracture underground shale to release trapped oil or gas. Depending on the depth and lateral length of the well, one million to 15 million gallons of water maybe required and then the well is fracked numerous times possibly using up to 60 million gallons or 20 acre feet of freshwater. This is enough water for 20 families of 4 people to use for an entire year. This is a tremendous water-intensive extraction process for a state with a current water shortage problem.

So why is fracking so controversial, causing an uproar in over 32 states and around the world? Maybe it is the two separate studies by the Environmental Protection Agency and the United States Geological Survey that found toxic carcinogenic chemicals used in fracking had contaminated the town of Pavillion, Wyoming's drinking water.

At the last Board of Supervisors meeting, the Helena Chemical storage and distribution center got approval on a vote of 4-1. Thank you to **Supervisor Teeter**, who was the sole "no" vote; he did not see the social or economic benefits to the community of Nelson.

It was a win for the US-Japanese owned multinational corporation (no surprise there), and a very sad day for the small community of Nelson and the neighboring organic Lundberg Family Farms, who just had the future of their town traded for corporate profit.



We know that poor communities are disproportionately saddled with environmental burdens and the negative social effects of projects like these; we work hard to keep it from happening in our own county.

BEC worked alongside the citizens of Nelson, who stood against this project; and were honored to stand with them in their efforts to protect their community and their lands.
