



PG&E to Cut More Trees: Please Help Speak Out August 31

We need your help speaking out for Chico's trees!

BEC has been actively advocating to save trees that are proposed to be removed as part of PG&E's plan to clear its underground gas transmission lines. A few months ago we reported that PG&E proposes to remove as many as 85 mature trees in the Comanche Creek greenway area within the Chico City limits, and dozens more throughout Butte County unincorporated areas.



The latest development is that there will be a public hearing in late August at the City of Chico Bidwell Park and Playground Commission meeting, scheduled for

Monday, August 31. This will be a very important opportunity for the community to raise our collective voices and let the City know how important these trees are. We're calling for the largest trees to be saved and for PG&E to mitigate for the removal of any trees with a robust replanting plan. PG&E's utility easement may give them the "right" to do whatever they want in this case. But with public outcry on this issue, we believe the City and the citizens can reduce the scope of this tree removal project and hold PG&E accountable for mitigating their impact.

Please mark your calendar and plan to join BEC at the City Council Chambers on Monday, August 31 at 6 pm. If you don't feel comfortable speaking at the podium, please come to the meeting anyway to show your support and concern. You can submit written comments in advance to the Clerk of the Commission at parkinfo@ChicoCA.gov.

The agenda and full staff report for this meeting will be posted 72 hours in advance at this website.

Help us be a voice for these trees! Let's save some mature oaks!

Stop Glenn-Colusa Irrigation District From Draining Our Aquifer!

In Butte County, water resources are constantly under threat. Considering the ever present threats to water in our valley, water warriors of the North State are forced to choose their battles wisely; **the following is a battle we cannot afford to lose.**

On June 16, Glenn-Colusa Irrigation District (GCID) released a Notice of Exemption for their 5 deep-water wells, each with capacity to produce an estimated 4,000 gallons per minute. That means, combined,



their wells have the capacity to produce 88 acre-feet per day, enough to supply 88 families with drinking water for an entire year. And now, **GCID wants to add five**

additional deep-water wells.

The draft Environmental Impact Report

for this proposed well project has been released and the district will be accepting comments until July 30, 2015. Butte Environmental Council is working diligently with Citizens Water Watch and citizens on strategies to protect our groundwater resources and stop these wells from draining our shared aquifer. We are also working with citizens from Glenn and Colusa counties who are rekindling the group Save Our Water Resources, which successfully stopped Crystal Geyser form further privatizing groundwater back in 2010.

Turns out, this is an old threat raising its ugly head again. GCID originally installed these wells for "research purposes" and <u>BEC sued to prevent them from being used for production</u> (groundwater extraction) and the judge ruled the wells could only be used for research. And yet, on June 16, GCID turned on the wells and started pumping, claiming they are exempt from environmental review.

If you are a concerned citizen, **let your voice be heard next week at GCID's July 22 public hearing at <u>Ord Bend Community Hall</u>. The deadline for submitting written comments is July 30. For more information about this threat and what you can do to speak out, <u>visit BEC's website</u>.**

Reducing the Ag Buffer = increased development and increased pesticide exposure

How are pesticides and increased rural development interconnected in Butte County? The County's proposed revisions to the General Plan Zoning Ordinance would reduce the 300 ft buffer between Ag land and residential homes.

The reason? The current rules limit the "development potential" on rural residential



zoned property. **In other words, developers can't put enough houses on rural lands adjacent to agriculture.** The County is now proposing to reduce the 300 ft buffer to as little as 25 ft in some cases! This 300 ft buffer is set based on the pesticide overspray drift and is in place to reduce exposure to pesticides.

The County's "Right-to-Farm" ordinance has merits but its adoption as currently written will result in increased pesticide exposure for neighboring homes and increased development in rural areas.

This is not good land use planning and will result in more conflicts between residential and ag, while taking away rural citizens' right to not have pesticides drift onto their homes, yard, pets and children.

BEC will give public comment on the Draft Environmental Impact Report at the <u>Butte County Planning Commission</u> on **Thursday, July 30 at 9am in Oroville at the County Chambers.** Please join us and speak out. Call 588-3605 to carpool from Chico to Oroville.

A Solar Story - You May be Next!

BEC is excited to share the "solar story" of **Bill and Lori Bowler**, who are the first people to take advantage of **Solar City's** promotional installation of a solar system and contribution to BEC through the <u>Energy Upgrade California Energy Ambassador Program!</u>

The couple had been thinking of going solar for years and it wasn't until the presentation at a recent BEC wine tasting fundraiser, and after talking with a Solar City representative, that they took the plunge.



"One incentive is a really generous tax credit this year," adds Bill. "Honestly, our main motivation is environmental," he adds. "There's the realistic scare of the drought, and sunnier days and less rain mean capturing more solar."

The 5.6-kilowatt system will be fully operational and hooked up within the next month, and is anticipated to provide nearly all (more than 97%) of the Bowler's energy needs.

Two more families have signed up for a solar system with Solar City through the BEC program: **Forough and Sean Molina**, and **Aaron and Heather Lyon.** BEC would like to thank them and Solar City for its generous contribution!

Time to Save Water and Energy (and how to talk to your neighbors about saving water)

Energy Saving Tips:

Investing a few dollars into a tube of caulk (under \$4/tube) or a package of weatherstripping (\$4/10ft) could save you at least \$20 a month on your heating and cooling bill. Bonus, sealing up drafts makes your home more comfortable.

Get in the habit of using the cold water tap when washing your hands. Turning on the hot tap uses energy even if you don't have the tap on long enough for the water to get hot.

Water Saving Tips:

Install low-flow aerators (\$3/each) on all your taps in the house. Each time

- you turn on the faucet, you'll be saving water. Already have them? Check to see what the GPM (gallons per minute) rating is. Older aerators are over 2.5qpm. Newer ones are rated from 0.5 2.2 qpm!
- Take 5 minute showers instead of 10 minute showers. Need a timer? BEC has 5 minute shower timers available for you!

New Recycling Legislation in CA

Mandatory recycling of organic waste is the next step toward achieving California's aggressive recycling and greenhouse gas (GHG) emission goals. California disposes approximately 30 million tons of waste in landfills each year, of which more than 30% could be used for compost or mulch.



Organic waste such as green materials and food materials are recyclable through composting and mulching, and through anaerobic digestion, which can produce renewable energy and fuel. **Greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions resulting from the decomposition of organic wastes in landfills have been identified as a significant source of emissions contributing to global climate change.**

Last October, Governor Brown signed AB 1826, requiring businesses that generate 8 cubic yards of organic waste or more to arrange for the recycling of their organic waste by April 1, 2016. Businesses that generate 4 cubic yards or more must comply by January 1, 2017. Stay tuned for info on how local haulers will roll out new services as this new law gets implemented.


