

The time has come to begin preparing for our annual Bidwell Park and Chico Creeks Cleanup!! Save the Date

September 17, 2016 9:00 am - 12:00 pm



Become a <u>Friend of the Cleanup!</u> Friends of the cleanup love wildlife and want to preserve habitat to endangered species for generations to come.

The Sierra Nevada Yellow-legged Frog (\$25) is listed as a State Threatened, Federally Endangered Species. The Western Pond Turtle (\$50) is listed as a Species of Special Concern in California. Two of the four runs of Wild Chinook Salmon (\$75) that migrate through the Sacramento Valley are listed under the Endangered Species Act. Winter-run Chinook Salmon are listed as both State and Federally Endangered. Spring-run Chinook Salmon are listed as both State and Federally Threatened. The Gray Wolf (\$100) is back from the brink! It is currently listed as State and Federally Endangered and is federally proposed for delisting.

June 21 is Budget decision day

Chico Tree Advocates's have proposed funding for the Tree Crew that is about a half of one percent of the proposed City budget.

Community Garden Plots Available

Are you interested in growing your own food but don't have a suitable garden space? We still have garden **plots available** this season in our <u>Humboldt</u> <u>Community Garden</u>, located on Humboldt Rd and El Monte Ave.



A one-year plot lease for the 2016-17 garden year is \$75 for a 15x15 plot (225 square feet). There is also a

refundable \$50 cleaning deposit. The lease includes water, limited liability insurance (a city requirement) and access to community tools and finished compost or bark chips, depending on available supplies.

We have one agency plot available for a nonprofit organization that measures 25x60 feet (1,500 square feet) and is \$375 for the year.

Recycling Education Tip: The most important "R"!

Though Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, and Rot have large positive impacts on waste diversion to the landfill, the most effective "R" you can use



is REFUSE. This means every time you find yourself in a position to accept a single-use product in your daily life, you simply say NO. Single-use products like plastic cutlery, paper plates, plastic bags, plastic wrapping/packaging, water bottles, and styrofoam are having tremendously negative effects to various ecosystems on our planet. Bottled water alone accounts for up to 1.5 million tons of plastic waste every year, 80 percent of which ends up in our landfills and ocean. Every year, countless birds and animals die after ingesting plastic trash. When these plastic particles enter the food chain, they often end up on our own plate. Just imagine how much of these microplastics we are ingesting.

How to fix this? REFUSE! Here are some things that help.

- 1. Carry reusable bags and water bottles with you as a part of your daily routine. Our friends at <u>ChicoBag</u>, and <u>Klean Kanteen</u> have everything you need to make this as convenient and stylish as possible.
- 2. Refuse all plastic straws, styrofoam cups, and plastic wrapping at restaurants and in your home kitchen.
- 3. When going out to eat, take the time to sit down and eat with family and friends instead of getting your food to go. You can bring own containers for leftovers.
