

The BEC Board of Directors is pleased to announce, following an extensive search, that Natalie Carter has been selected as the next executive director of the Butte Environmental Council. Carter began with BEC on March 1, 2016.



Carter brings a great deal of experience and expertise to the job. She comes to us from the <u>Chico</u> <u>Certified Farmers Market</u> (CCFM) where she has had many different titles, from market assistant to general manager. She dedicated over four years there, bringing locally grown food to the communities in our region, building community connections and partnerships for CCFM as well as improving customer service and expanding the market. Carter earned a bachelor's in general biology from Chico State in 2009. Prior to returning to Chico she worked as a biologist and

surveyor at the Great Basin Bird Observatory in Reno, NV and volunteered at the US Fish and Wildlife Service in Sacramento, CA.

An active voice in her community, Carter served as treasurer for the <u>Honey Run Covered Bridge Association</u> in 2013 and 2014, and is currently serving on the <u>Chico Natural Food Cooperative</u> Board of Directors. She is eager to take on BEC's legacy as a champion for the needs of our community, to defend its resources and to make a meaningful difference as a representative for our land, air and water.

Growing up in Chico, Carter developed a deep-rooted connection for the environment and community. She believes that passing on this passion to others is the best way to ensure the future protection of our natural resources. Carter lives in Chico with her husband, Eric, and their young daughter.

BEC's latest Advocacy Successes

We've been out there on the front lines putting your membership dollars to good use! There's been plenty of media coverage on some, but absolutely no recent coverage on the well moratorium ordinance extension so this is exclusive news!

BEC and our allies in the Move the Junkyard coalition pushed the Planning Commission to

"make the right decision" on the Chico Scrap Metal issue and the commissioners voted with us -- to uphold the goals of the neighborhood plan and relocate an incompatible toxic industrial facility away from schools and residences. Read all about it in the CN&R's cover story from last week.

Meanwhile the Glenn County Planning Commission did not vote to protect Stony Creek and instead approved the use permit for the proposed waste facility near Orland. BEC has been vocal on this issue, alongside an organized group of



Concerned Citizens of Glenn County and the citizens are now filing an appeal of the decision.

BEC was publicly accused of being misinformed on this topic and we hope you saw the rebuttal letter recently, in which executive director Robyn DiFalco underscored that when BEC takes a position on these issues, it's because we are informed, engaged and have researched the issue.

We're also happy to report another vote that did go our way: The well moratorium ordinance in Glenn County that puts a hold on new well-drilling was granted an extension (through May 17) by the Glenn County Board of Supervisors. This moratorium is currently the only thing preventing the Glenn-Colusa Irrigation District (GCID) from installing new deep-water production wells to extract and export massive quantities of groundwater from our shared water resource, the Tuscan Aquifer. The amount of water extracted by our neighboring county has a huge impact on water in Butte County and we've got to work with our neighbors to protect this shared resource. BEC has been working with citizens and policymakers across the river to make the case for extending this moratorium until the implementation of groundwater protection is completed.

Please remember that **the only way BEC can achieve these important victories is because of your membership support.** Our grants primarily fund our educational outreach and programs, but without community support from member donations, our advocacy efforts would not be possible. Please show us you care about these issues and put your donation to work through BEC's advocacy efforts.

Successful Block Party Removes 7.2 Tons of Debris from Little Chico Creek

In February the Butte Environmental Council pulled 7.2 tons of waste from Little Chico Creek with the help of 67 volunteers. BEC's <u>Block Parties with a Purpose Program</u> has collected a total of 9 tons of rubbish from Chico's waterways on the first Saturday of every month since December 2015. This accomplishment couldn't have been met without the tremendous help of local

volunteers dedicated to making our community better.

Recycling Education Tip:
Reduce over Recycle

The Recycling and Rubbish Education program at BEC teaches the four R's - Reduce, Reuse, Recycle and Rot. We can't stress enough how important the order is!

Reduce is the biggest and most essential of all the lessons. Reduce how much waste is made, be it from the manufacturing process, the packaging process or the consumption process. Then **Reuse** what materials and items do come into our lives and



finally choose to **recycle** those items that can be. Lastly **rot** is nature's way of recycling -- compost those food scraps and keep them from creating methane in the landfill, while returning nutrients to the soil.

Energy Conservation Tip: Which LED is right for me?

Can you find the LED lightbulb in the photo? The answer is they are all LED light bulbs! LED, or Light Emitting Diodes light bulbs are made to fit any fixture and come in different sizes, brightnesses and colors. LED bulbs are



75% more efficient than incandescents and last four times as long as the spiral shaped CFLs (Compact Flourescent Lightbulbs). By replacing old bulbs with Energy Star LED bulbs you can save \$30 to \$80 on energy bills.

Don't know what to do with your old CFLs? Take them to a certified drop off center like Home Depot or Lowe's and take a look at the new lower priced LED bulbs today.

Be aware of the new lingo: **Lumens, Kelvin, and Watts**. The **Lumen** is a unit of measurement for the brightness of Light. The brighter the light, the higher the lumen. **Kelvin** refers to the color appearance of the light. For the kitchen you may want a white light, so look for 4,100K, for the bedroom, a softer light is more fitting so opt for a 2,500K. **Watts** still refers to how much energy the bulb uses but it no longer equates to light-output.
