Block Parties With a Purpose

Neighbors and volunteers turned out in full force (nearly 60 strong) last Saturday, February 28 to rid Little Chico Creek of **garbage and an invasive weed called arundo**. This was a neighbor-driven effort to tackle some of the ubiquitous problems that plague Chico's urban streams.



The Mount Lassen Chapter of the California

Native Plant Society (CNPS) and Butte Environmental Council (BEC) recognized that frustrations were growing among the creekside residents, many of whom were ready to take action but did not have an avenue or the authority to do so. For example, it is illegal to remove weeds from the creek bank without permission and there are laws and safety issues when cleaning up homeless encampments. And so, "Block Parties with a Purpose" was born. When neighbors gather they are supported by BEC, CNPS and the City of Chico Parks Department with safety assurances, tools, dumpsters, matching volunteers and lunch (yum!)

We are all working towards the goal that urban waterways can once again be the **beautiful little neighborhood creeks** and healthy wildlife habitat corridors that they once were.

BEC's Latest Advocacy Efforts

PG&E Tree Removals

Have you heard about the hundreds of trees removed at the Oroville Cemetery recently? We have been working hard to learn details about **PG&E's plans to remove hundreds of trees throughout Butte County** that supposedly threaten or compromise underground gas lines. BEC has been meeting with PG&E and with County and



City of Chico officials to learn more about the proposed project. We are strategizing ways to reduce the scale of the project (number of trees removed) and how to ensure that appropriate mitigation measures (tree replacements) are planned and completed. Stay tuned for future public meetings about this issue.

Fracking

Thanks to all who showed up for the Feb 10th Butte County Board of Sups hearing which took all day and had a packed audience. The ban wasn't adopted; instead supervisors directed staff to proceed with an ordinance to ban disposal of waste in injection wells and present a Conditional Use Permit requirement for fracking. The effort continues with the development of new strategies and of course the citizen initiative will be on the June 2016 election.

Groundwater Legislation

We're actively "watchdogging" the implementation process for this new legislation and weighing in on how groundwater basin lines are drawn, who has authority over each basin, and how rules for "water budgets" will be determined.

Arundo Removal in Little Chico Creek

We're still waiting to hear whether funding has been awarded for a \$1 million dollar grant with the City of Chico to remove the invasive weed Arundo Donax. Meanwhile, we're moving forward with partners at the City and the Native Plant Society to continue chipping away at the problem. (See block parties article above.)



Ag Buffers & Setbacks in the Butte County General Plan

The County is working on revisions to

the setback requirements for residential development in rural areas, anticipated for spring/summer 2015. Depending on how the rules are written, it could lead to a significant increase in development (or not). We're waiting for the final documents and the full Environmental Impact Report later this year. While out of date, this link provides some background info about what is being considered.

Citizen Science Outings: A scientific exploration of the Big Chico Creek Watershed



Third Annual Environmental Community Gathering

A coalition group of local environmental organizations will host the Environmental Community Gathering on Friday, March 27 at the CARD Community Center following the last keynote presentation of the This Way to Sustainability Conference at Chico State.

The reception will provide an opportunity for the organizations of the **Environmental Coalition** of Butte County to reaffirm the importance of working together. This event will take place just following the final keynote speaker of the Chico State's This Way To Sustainability Conference. Attendees will gain a fulsome picture of our



progress and challenges in environmental work through visiting the tables, participating in a scavenger hunt, and connecting with one another.

The Environmental Coalition was formed as an effort to unite the various local environmental groups around the biggest environmental issues taking

place in Chico and Butte County, including the implementation of the General Plans (City and County), the Butte Regional Conservation Plan, the Agricultural Mitigation Ordinance, climate change issues and water issues.

Anyone from the public is welcome to attend and we'll even have activities for the kids. Participating organizations will provide free appetizers and beverages (including beer and wine) will be available for purchase at the event.

We installed our third rainwater catchment system, most recently at Wildflower Open Classroom last week with junior high students (who were awarded with an extra math lesson calculating water conservation efforts) and first and second grade students who joined in to help paint!

More Mandates, More Recycling

One of the most common things we hear from County residents is, "Why don't I have recycling services at my house if I live in the county and not the city?" Well, good news! As of March 1st, you may be able to receive recycling services where you could not before.

Recycling and green waste collection will now be part of basic collection services in six new recycling zones within the County. These areas include: Durham, Magalia, South Oroville, Thermalito, Kelly Ridge, and the outskirts of the Chico "sphere of influence".



California has a statewide mandate for local cities and counties to divert 75% of their waste from landfills. This means adding more options for residents to recycle. Butte County is doing their part to make this process efficient and sustainable for all residents. According to county recycling coordinator Steve Rodowick, "We will organize the unincorporated parts of the County into specific service areas for the collection of waste and recyclables. This allows the waste haulers, as well as the County, to operate more efficiently and therefore add more services to meet the new State mandates. With a more efficient system there will be **fewer trash/recycling trucks on the road, less wear and tear on those roads, fewer greenhouse gas emissions** and will provide a stable funding source for the Neal Road Recycling and Waste Facility and the Butte Regional Household Hazardous Waste Facility and will allow Butte County to develop additional renewable energy projects."

From the Energy Ambassador: What is a Negawatt?


It's the **CLEANEST** form of energy. **It is the watt of energy that is saved, or conserved, and therefore not produced!** Avoiding the use of energy in the first place is the cleanest and least expensive answer.

"One watt never used is one that doesn't pollute."

Here's one way to get negawatts in your

home: Seal up the largest air leaks in your house-the ones that whistle on windy days, or feel drafty. The worst culprits are usually not windows and doors, but utility cut-throughs for pipes ("plumbing penetrations"), gaps around chimneys and recessed lights in insulated ceilings, and unfinished spaces behind cupboards and closets.
